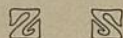

BY-PRODUCTS OF LIVERPOOL'S WASTE PAPER SCHEME.

In Room "C" the baling of Waste Paper is shown.

Here we present to the Liverpool public for the first time the useful side products of this new industry. Nothing is wasted.

The covering on Ledgers is converted into wallets, shoes, blotters, purses, and numerous other articles.

The boards are used in two ways—the thick ones into tables, notice boards, &c.—the thinner backs are made into NEW LIVER FIRE STICKS, for which a patent is sought.

They are cheap, effective, and a great joy to the house-keeper, who by them saves paper and wood.

SPECIAL ROOM "C."

SALVAGE OF TIN-FOIL AND WASTE METAL.

Exhibit showing variety of recoverable waste in a wide range of metals, from the Bradford "Tinfoil Collection for the Wounded," organised by Miss Scott, Poplar Grove, Shipley. With the exception of iron, all metals are accepted and must be sorted in the following classes:—Tin foil, or "Silver paper," from chocolates, &c.; Aluminium (sheet or foil), Lead and lead mixtures (from plumbers' waste to toy soldiers), also White-Metal of any description; Brass and Copper (knobs, bolts, kettles, &c.), oddments in Silver, Zinc and Pewter, but NOT tins, these being tinned iron. Method of collection—central Depot with "Receivers" at convenient distances, to whom collectors can hand in supplies. Sale of "scrap" every two or three months to Smelter or Metal Merchant at £30 to £36 per ton, amount realised being distributed among local War Charities.

The object of this exhibit is to show how to produce the maximum quantity of food on a plot of 300 square yards by means of a scientific and commonsense arrangement of crops, and by intercropping.

The Back Garden Models are designed to show the contrast between neglect and industry in respect to the treatment of small back yard plots.

Plans and specifications of materials required for plots of the area mentioned may be obtained from the attendant. Smaller plots may be planned on similar lines, and will require proportionately smaller quantities of seeds, &c.

All the work, which is done at the Head Quarters, Midland Adelphi Hotel (kindly lent by the Directors) is sent directly to the Front (Field Ambulances, Clearing Stations, &c.), and to Hospital Ships.

NOTES by Mr. J. G. LEGGE.

The exhibition of work from schools under the control of the Liverpool Education Authority has been confined in the main to that done in the elementary schools where the great bulk of the children of the city receive their training. Exhibits have, however, been included showing what is being done by special classes of the juvenile population whose peculiar requirements have called for the institution of particular types of schools such as Day Industrial Schools, Special Schools for children physically and mentally defective, and the School for the Deaf. The working parties, which will be on view, will be found to be engaged in such practical work as may fitly be included in an exhibition for the promotion of National Welfare.

There will not be much fancy work done. The needlework will be thrift needlework, and the cobbling will be found to be, what cobbling always is, the finest exemplar of the old maxim "mending not ending."

Similarly girls will be found to be receiving some initiation into the mysteries of washing a baby; and boys will illustrate what can be made from odds and ends.

So much for the live exhibits. So far as regards the dead exhibits, the same principle will be followed. Examples of various kinds of the handwork which is going on in the schools will be shown, many of them illustrating what can be done with waste material.

There will be fresh exhibits daily of food cooked by the boys and girls, and of clothes laundered by school children; also clothes mended by the children will be shown. The question has been asked—Can anyone imagine work more truly educative for the school boy in one of the poorer quarters of our large cities than the mending of his own breeches, stockings, and boots?

The work has a deeper significance than may at first appear. The boy is not merely doing something useful, he is doing something calculated to raise his self-respect; and he will be dull indeed if on his consciousness does not dawn after the idea of usefulness to himself, that of usefulness to his mother and to others about him. And just as it will do the boy good to give him a turn once a week in the Girls' Domestic Centre, so it will do the girl good to set her to work once a week with a hammer and nails in the Boys' Workshop. Stress is to be laid upon this idea of usefulness, because the possibility of implanting even in germ the idea of social service is a valuable addition to the list of virtues ascribed to manual work by those who have been preaching the doctrine of it in season and out of season for years past.

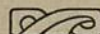
