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A few words to the reader may be acceptable in explaining how it has been possible to compile a Pictorial Programme of the Royal Procession with a due regard for correctness some time before the events depicted take place. It was suggested that an Illustrated Programme of the Royal Jubilee Procession should be produced and sold for the benefit of the Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund; this has been an arduous undertaking, but many formidable difficulties vanished like magic when it was known that Her Majesty the Queen was graciously taking great interest in the Prince's Hospital Fund. It will be remembered that at a meeting at Marlborough House H.R.H. the Prince of Wales said:—"On informing the Queen that a meeting of the General Council would take place to-day, she has empowered me to say that though up till now she has not desired that any suggestion from her should take the place of any given purpose to commemorate her Diamond Jubilee, yet she rejoices to hear what a large sum has already been subscribed to the London Hospital Fund, and wishes the Fund every success." The knowledge of the fact, and the known sympathy and deep interest of His Royal Highness in the Fund which bears his name, caused those in authority readily to give the information required by the large staff of artists, who have been actively employed in sketching from life every detail of uniform and costume, so that the pictures should be correct.

The Honorary Secretaries take this opportunity of expressing their acknowledgment to the Directors and Staff of the Graphic and Daily Graphic, who have carried out the literary and artistic work connected with this Programme on behalf of the Fund, and have also undertaken the business management and the printing, charging only the actual outlays incurred.

The result is before the reader, and it is earnestly hoped by those who have been instrumental in endeavouring to make this Programme of lasting interest to the public at home and abroad, that it may be the means of materially assisting the beneficent object, which, we know, is so thoroughly acceptable to Her Majesty as commemorating her Diamond Jubilee.

It is hoped that this Programme may not only form an illustrated guide to the Procession, but also a memento of an eventful day, worthy to be preserved.

THE QUEEN'S COMMEMORATION

THE unique and magnificent spectacle which will be presented by the streets of London on the 22nd June, 1897, is the result of a natural impulse in the hearts of the people of the British Empire to do honour to their beloved Sovereign.

Sixty years ago the daughter of the Duke of Kent ascended the throne of Great Britain and Ireland; for sixty years as Queen, and as Queen and Empress, she has occupied that exalted station. At the very beginning of her reign she obtained, and throughout the whole of it she has maintained, a firm hold of the affectionate loyalty of her subjects. And not of her own people only, but of all peoples. Throughout the civilised world no name is held in higher reverence than that of Victoria the Queen and Victoria the woman,

A thousand claims to reverence closed In her as Mother, Wife, and Queen.


The sixtieth year of Her Majesty's reign sees those claims upon our reverence and our love rivetted closer than ever. Even at this time, when, as she very well knew, the people of these islands would be eager to dedicate to her the costliest of memorials, the Queen gave it to be understood that what would best please her would be the relief of human suffering. She chose for her memorial the hospital ward rather than the statue; the Jubilee monument of Victoria is the blessing of suffering men, women and children.

And so it is that the metropolis of the Empire now presents a spectacle so remarkable. From Canada, from Africa, from Australia, the Sons of the Empire have come to join with the people of Great Britain and Ireland in the homage paid to their Sovereign. Those who witness the splendid spectacle in which this homage has culminated are not likely ever to forget it. It is hoped that this little book, devoted to the cause which the Queen has favoured, may serve in after years to call to remembrance the stirring and glorious scene of June 22nd, 1897.


THE HEAD OF THE PROCESSION

At the head of the procession rides Captain O. Ames, of the 2nd Life Guards, the tallest officer in the British Army. Following him are four troopers of the same regiment




THE GUN DETACHMENT OF THE ROYAL NAVY




THE HUSSARS









THE NEW SOUTH WALES LANCERS

No Colonial corps is better known in England than the New South Wales Regiment of Lancer Volunteers. A detachment of the regiment was in England in 1893 for the opening of the Imperial Institute. Their accourtements are the same as those of the Lancer regiments of the British Army, but the broad-brimmed hat turned up at the side takes the place of the characteristic Lancer headdress. They wear khaki-coloured tunics and Bedford cord breeches. Four officers and twenty non-commissioned officers and men have come to England for the Commemoration. They are under the command of Captain Vernon



THE VICTORIA MOUNTED RIFLES

From the colony of Victoria come three officers and forty-eight non-commissioned officers and men of the Victoria Mounted Rifles

They wear a khaki-coloured paiform with maroon facings and slouch hats with a twisted puggaree




QUEENSLAND MOUNTED RIFLES


THE CAPE MOUNTED RIFLES


SOUTH AUSTRALIAN LANCERS




NATAL CAVALRY

Lieutenant Crompton, both of the Carbineers, are in command





A portion of the Volunteer Defence Force of the Island of Trinidad




THE CYPRIOTE ZAPTIEHS



MALTA ARTILLERY

The Royal Malta Artillery is one of the regular corps of the British Army, although it is recruited entirely in the island. It numbers 460 of all ranks, and its uniform and training are similar to those of the Royal Artillery. The Imperial Parliament votes its pay and maintenance annually. The Malta Artillery served in the Egyptian War of 1882, and bears the distinction, "Egypt, 1882"






WEST AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY








JAMAICA ARTILLERY




THE SIERRA LEONE FORCE AND HAUSAS

The representatives from British Guiana are one European officer and twenty-three men of the Native Police




